	Adjacent to the K.C.I.C. Learn about the unique flora native to the Wapna'ki/Acadian Forest Region planted on 6 acres. This 1.5-hour tour will lead you through 9 distinct habitats including a bog, marsh, and sand barren. You will also be introduced to what happens behind the scenes in the glasshouses and plant research facilities.
15h45-16h15	Haiku: A Balm for Healing by Blanca Baquero. Reading from her own haiku collection and those of other poets, Blanca will describe how haiku can become a form of therapy, offering catharsis and comfort during challenging periods in life.
